Reverend Joan Riding led us in prayer.

#### **Appointment of Vestry Clerk**

Moved by Deb Donoghue, seconded by Sandra Donatucci that Glenn Clark be appointed Vestry Clerk. CARRIED.

#### **Minutes from Last Vestry Meeting**

Moved by Sandra Donatucci, seconded by Phyllis Harris that the minutes be accepted as printed. CARRIED.

#### Reports

There was a discussion about the marriage record, which should read Timothy Maslonek, and Judith Doris McCaskill.

Funerals should add Lennox Dundas.

Glenn Clark suggested that all reports be proof-read before being published.

Moved by TAD Higginson, seconded by Mike Thomas that all the 2019 reports be accepted as printed. CARRIED.

Vic Wootton asked about the attendance for the Wood's Cemetery memorial service. Glenn Clark mentioned that this was in the Wood's Cemetery Report.

TAD Higginson offered to do a grammar check on next year's Vestry Report.

TAD Higginson thanked Reverend Joan for visiting the neighbouring firemen. He also thanked Vic Wootton for his memorial for Alice Purdy. He also volunteered to host Coffee Hours. TAD Higginson offered to send invitations to parishioners for inclusion in their electronic calendars.

#### **Telephone Replacement**

There is no discussion because the telephone is under contract for 2 years.

#### **Parish Dreams**

Reverend Joan Riding mentioned that her suggestion related to the damaged corner of the church interior rather than painting the whole church.

Sandra Donatucci asked about the date of the Yard Sale, July 4<sup>th</sup>. Mike Thomas mentioned that the Thomas family is not available for late June.

#### **Accessibility Fund**

\$8,000 has been invested in the Consolidated Trust Fund for the possible use for accessibility. TAD Higginson apologized for not contacting Carleton University about design of accessibility through a 4<sup>th</sup> year architecture class.

Reverend Joan Riding mentioned about the impact of the Bank Street widening project and dealing with Councillor Carol Anne Meehan.

#### **Christian Education**

Reverend Joan reviewed the history from the last couple of years. We now have a plan for Lent. There was a discussion that we now have a few children for Sunday school, which normally takes place on the first Sunday of the month. TAD Higginson is now in charge of the Sunday school.

#### **Weekly Bulletin and Vestry Report Formats**

Glenn Clark mentioned that the Pew Bulletin was revised after last year's bulletin eliminating the calendar to make the bulletin more concise. Irene Thomas liked the calendar. TAD Higginson offered to prepare the Vestry Report next year. Reverend Joan has another idea to involve new parishioners. There was a discussion about the format of the Comparative Balance Sheet in the Vestry Report.

#### 2020 Budget

Mike Thomas talked about the Financial Statement. The \$8,000 placed in the Consolidated Trust Fund does not get included for calculating our Diocesan fair share. Once we spend the \$8,000 then it will be included in our fair share obligation. Mike Thomas mentioned the small amount in the Deanery account that has been there for several years.

Mike Thomas then presented the budget in detail.

There was mention of meat vendor joining Foster's for the 2020 season.

The following are the changes to the budget:

Telephone expense changed from \$1225 to \$1308.96

Memorial Fund Revenue increased from \$600 to \$1,000

Building Fund Revenue increased from \$418 to \$768

The budget surplus is revised from \$1435 to \$2101

Moved by Mike Thomas seconded by TAD Higginson that the Budget be accepted as revised. CARRIED.

There were thanks given to Mike Thomas for his excellent Budget report.

Mike Thomas presented the Wood's Cemetery financial statement. There was a surplus of \$1,458.74 and balance of \$3,233.50.

He also presented the Ladies Guild Financial Statement. \$1,000 is donated by the Ladies Guild to the church. Total assets are \$11,493.79 including GIC

There was a discussion about the role of the Envelope Secretary.

#### **Nominating Committee Report**

Irene Thomas has offered to join Parish Council. Please change Benda to Brenda Houle.

Moved by Deb Donoghue, seconded by TAD Higginson that the nominating committee report be accepted and those appearing are elected. CARRIED

#### Readers, Intercessors, Servers, and Guilds

#### **New Business**

Reverend Joan brought up the episcopal election. Chuck Wootton and Phyllis Harris are our electors and Reverend Joan is part of the retired clergy. March 2, 3, 4, 5 are the regional meetings to introduce nominees for Bishop, questions and answers and meet and greet. These meetings are open to all parishioners not just Synod delegates.

TAD Higginson suggested that we have name tags.

Moved by TAD Higginson seconded by Carlotta that TAD create name tags. CARRIED. Chuck and Vic Wootton were opposed.

A question was asked about allowing pets into the church.

TAD Higginson would like to invite his son Casey and father-in-law Gino to re-plaster the damaged corner of the church. TAD suggested that we pay for materials and Casey's time. Vic Wootton suggested that we needed an estimate.

TAD Higginson suggested that we have a cube for credit cards and Paypal on the website. Glenn Clark asked about the cost. There is a charge per transaction. The matter was dropped.

#### **Votes of Thanks**

Reverend Joan thanked the two wardens, Chuck and everybody else.

There was a round of applause.

## **Vestry Report of the Priest-in-Charge**

St. James Anglican Church, Leitrim February 24, 2021.

I am the Church
You are the Church,
We are the Church together.
All of God's people
all around the world,
Yes, we're the Church together!

Where do I start? How do I begin? What can I say? The past year, 2020, was difficult for all of us. Two of our St. James parish family had died in the final months of 2019, and Alice Purdy died at the beginning of January, 2020. "May Alice's soul and all the souls of the departed rest in peace and may light perpetual shine upon her."

Shadows began to gather. Let me take you through my diary of events. In January, we began to hear news stories about a strange new illness which was moving very quickly. At first, it was not considered to be very dangerous, more like a cold. Very soon, though, it became obvious that this was a very serious illness indeed, deadly in many cases. Nevertheless, at the end of February, we were able to have our Vestry meeting together in person, and we planned for the year 2020, not knowing how the year would go. Almost immediately, it became apparent that our plans would have to change.

On March 14, Bishop Chapman announced that it would be necessary to stop meeting in person because the COVID illness had begun to rage across Canada. A provincial "lock down' was imposed to try to minimize the effects of the disease, and all religious services and gatherings of any kind were cancelled. We were all told to shelter at home. Sadly, we had to close our church buildings. While I found this hard, I knew the Church would continue! I had to adjust my pastoral response.

We had several weddings and baptisms planned, but unfortunately, those plans had to be delayed for the future. It has always been my practice to visit parishioners in the hospitals, but in this pandemic, no clergy have been allowed to visit in homes, hospitals, retirement residences or long term care homes. I very much regret that we have several people that I would definitely have visited had I been permitted.

Our parish consists of a few young families, several middle-aged individuals and families, and many of us over sixty-five. Most of us are healthy and some of us are quite vulnerable. Without visitors and opportunities for gathering, isolation could easily become an important problem. Would people have enough to eat? How were people to get their groceries and medications? How would people cope with job loss and home schooling? There are so many ways to be isolated. To confront isolation and to find ways to encourage our community, that first week, I developed a weekly Evening Prayer service based on the one in our Book of Alternative Services, (the BAS, or the Green Book, as I usually call it). I proposed to send it to the Wardens and they undertook to send the new services weekly by email to everybody who could receive it. To other people, respecting the contact rules in place, it was hand delivered so that everybody had a way to worship together.

We agreed that we would have a service of Morning Prayer weekly because we could get together at one time, if not in person. Again, relying on the BAS, I developed a service we could send around by e-mail. or hand deliver as necessary. Each week a reflection from me was included. We would all worship at our usual time on a Sunday morning, but in our own homes. Our Wardens also undertook to distribute these services.

We did this for two weeks and then TAD Higginson proposed an idea he had been working on. It was both brilliant and a bit overwhelming for me. We could all meet by Zoom. I didn't even know what Zoom was. Using our computers, we could meet in person and both see and talk with one another. The computer process meant that we combined our two parishes of All Saints and St. James for worship, which caused a little consternation, but we worked that out. We

could sing hymns and have time to chat together before worship and even have coffee together after our worship.

For me it meant learning how to use the computer for this new purpose. Not everybody liked the idea, and not everybody was able to do it, but TAD persevered with us. He contacted many of us to prepare our computers and to teach us. He spent hours with me on the phone to teach me the process and to have practice runs. Again, respecting the contact rules, he went to many homes to up-grade computers. He coached us all. And thanks to TAD, it has worked out for many people. For those who can not attend in this way, or who do not like the process, they still receive the electronic or paper version, and we all can worship together in that way. March 29, we had our first worship time together by Zoom with 26 people attending.

After a few weeks of effort, we realized that we could not sing together because of timing processes of each computer. It was really bad, so bad that we thought we would have to forego music altogether.

However, Mike Thomas volunteered to be our singer, with Sylvia. Irene offered to play their home organ to lead the music, as she has ever since. It worked because they are all using the same computer. In addition, our wardens took over the formatting of the bulletin, which was a big help to me. The worship life of our Church community continues.

Meanwhile, it seemed to me necessary to be in touch with people individually. On St. Patrick's Day, I began weekly phone calls, sometimes twice weekly, calls to people who were ill or otherwise isolated. With that organized, I began a rotation through our parish list, phoning five households each day from each parish of St. James, and All Saints. Other people joined me in keeping telephone contact and that has continued. Thank you for your trust in allowing me to visit with you regularly in this new way. For those people who prefer it, I maintained contact through email, and surprisingly to me, that has worked too because it is much more convenient for people having to juggle their time commitments. The pastoral life of the Church continues.

To liven things up, though, in April and May, I was asked several times what I was doing now with all my free time! That question reminded me of the goodness of laughter together.

In June, I reduced the number of my phone calls to four daily in each parish. I realized that my pastoral phone calls plus all the regular planning and information exchange calls and emails were getting to be just too much for me, and COVID restrictions were beginning to be eased by that time so people were not home alone so much.

We have sent out several parish letters over these nine months, some electronically, some by hand and two by post, to be absolutely certain that everybody is up to date with our parish life, including our continuing outreach projects and our financial position. The life of the Church continues.

At the beginning of the year, we had hoped the pandemic would run its course quickly and we might even be able to meet for Easter, but that was not possible. Still, we had 65 people from both parishes together by Webex (which we were using instead of Zoom by this time). Our new Bishop, Shane Parker, formed a committee to help us all understand the risks of the pandemic and to develop procedures for eventual re-opening our doors. With many restrictions, the Bishop allowed parishes to have in-person worship beginning September 6. At first, we thought we might be able to do this. But we learned that many of our folks preferred to wait until we are all vaccinated. Also, with only a few people being allowed into the building at a time, many people would have been excluded. And finally, the clincher was the realization that our ventilation system does not meet the requirements for safe re-opening. With the Archdeacon's approval and the Bishop's consent, we continued the programme we had developed. (Many other small parishes did the same.)

So finally, we come to Advent and Christmas. I had the fun again this year of purchasing little tokens for our parish children and grandchildren. I wrote individual cards to their families and included little wooden tree ornaments with my good wishes. I wanted them to know we care for them even though we cannot be together yet.

We lamented, thinking we could not have a Christmas Pageant; but one idea led to others and we made plans to have the pageant in a new way. We had a two parish, intergenerational, electronically produced, lively Christmas Pageant. We even had costumes and backgrounds. Emboldened by the success of this joint activity, we had a service of Carols and

Readings the Sunday after Christmas with music from three households. I realized that continuing with some of our favourite worship activities, even in an unfamiliar way, gave us unexpected joy, drew us more together and increased our confidence for 2021.

We have even welcomed people into the parish life of St. James. Who ever thought that would happen in this time? We have maintained contact with people who have moved away so that they know they are always part of us.

I am so thankful for our Wardens, Glenn Clark and Victor Wootton. They have served generously and freely and have gone way beyond their prescribed duties. Our Treasurer's commitments to our parish life have also been different from usual this year with extra reports to our diocese, and people contributing in various ways differently from usual. Even the administration and financial life of the Church continues.

Thank you all for your trust, your prayers, and your suggestions. Thank you for your time and your willingness to adapt to a different way of our Church life. Still together, but different in many ways. This will be over. We will be back together, face to face. We pray for peace and health for each other and for the world God loves.

Well, we are now in 2021 and St. James is still in operation. We will mention the names of some of the volunteers who made us able to operate during this crisis. We will outline many of the tasks, some of which were quite amazing, that they performed for us. It is this document that traditionally narrates the contribution of so many. It is basically the only method we have of giving recognition and showing our appreciation. It is important to note that the following is probably not a complete list but it covers most of those who helped in the background. During the year of virtual services Joan delivered some of the best reflection I have ever had the honour of listening to.

Always positive and never demanding, it has been and will continue to be a wonderful time at St. James. Never discouraging and always positive she was and is the perfect match to hold both St. James and All Saints Greely together moving forward.

We are so lucky to have her. Thanks from all of us Joan!

#### The Passing of Our Friend, Alice Purdy

In 2023 I will be marking my 50<sup>th</sup> year attending St. James. When you are around a group of people that long, especially a congregation mostly in their senior years; it is not uncommon to have to say goodbye to many friends and colleagues you have come to know, respect and admire. We found out only a week before her death on January 7, 2020 that she was dying and had little time.

I have seen or attended the funerals of many St. James people over the years. Some I cannot even remember their names but remember their faces. All their passing were upsetting but it was at Alice's funeral that the loss hit me hard. As I carried out the cross at the end of the service, I was really tuned into the fact that she was gone; She's not coming back. I managed to get to the back with the cross but thanked God St. James did not have a longer center aisle.

Alice was a no-nonsense person who had no trouble letting you know how she felt about things. If you didn't hear her opinion on a subject; don't worry it was coming. I remember attending a meeting at the church and got engaged in conversation with the person on my right. During the conversation I had moved my chair to a 45 degree angle pointing to the person I was talking to. I was not aware I had done this. Alice walked by and stopped and then gave me proper hell for turning my back to the person at my left.

On another day after church, the other side of Alice came out. As I was talking with someone with my back to the aisle, I felt someone fussing with my collar on my coat. It was Alice who noticed it was wrinkled and stopped to straighten it out. That was our Alice. Give you heck or help you out-whatever she felt was needed. To this day I cannot seat myself at a meeting until I've checked to see if my chair is on a 90 degree angle to the person on my left and on my right. Also I have yet to put on my coat anymore without checking the collar to see if it is wrinkled. She must have been one hell-of-a mother!

My fondest memory of Alice was holding young Graysen Dowhan in her arms just two months before her death. She had no idea she only had a couple of months left. To see that wonderful smile of hers from ear to ear looking at this tiny new life summed up for me exactly what Alice Purdy was made with.

Glenn captured that scene with his camera and put the picture in last year's Vestry. It is, and always will be, one of my favourite pictures.

God Bless you Alice. I won't say goodbye. I will say only-a la prochaine-till we meet again!

#### **Observations and Conclusions**

#### **Finances**

When the pandemic hit us in April that caused the closing of St. James church building and in-face servicers, we all began to panic. The fear was, and we had good reason to believe this would be the result, that our attendance would drop significantly and our finances would fall through the floor. There was little direction from the Diocese except to stop in-house services. No mention as to when we could open again. In fairness to the Diocese they simply didn't know either. Massive confusion and fear of the unknown was a good way to describe St. James.

Well almost a year later as we are well into 2021, the impact of Covid-19 is known and much more better understood. Our finances <u>DID NOT DROP</u>. In fact, we actually brought in more funds. At this point in time, we have over \$9,000 in surplus funds. All our bills are paid and all our commitments and responsibilities have been met. Considering that both our dinners, our yard sale, murder mystery and every other regular fund raiser were cancelled and we <u>still increased our surplus</u>, is absolutely amazing.

The reasons for this is the fact that regular givers gave even more, that regular givers continued their support of St. James even though we were not worshipping face to face, and new givers came along.

Add to this the realization that we will probably lose a few regulars, but we have also picked up new members as well. We won't know the real story until; we are back in church with face to face services, but we seem to have grown during this crisis.

Suffice to say that the final status of the effect of the pandemic is still unknown but the fear and confusion we felt last year at this time has disappeared. **Thanks be to God! Aging Volunteers** 

St. James is blessed with a host of very capable and experienced volunteers. We are so fortunate in that regard. It is important to point out however, that many of these volunteers are quite elderly. I raise this issue, not because we want to replace these towers of experience and strength but simply get them some help. Involve other people that can begin to grasp the complexities and responsibilities that St. James has to administer.

The purpose is not to replace; we really don't want them less. But realizing that they are human, we cannot ignore the fact that eventually they may need to step back a little. That someone else may have to take the lead. Looking ahead I think we all agree that it would be far better to have them less than to not have them at all.

To that end I suggest that we make a strong effort to get help for Mike Thomas at treasurer. Mike's job of treasurer involves accounting. We need to get him help with

someone with accounting experience and expertise. Not to replace him but simply to help him and learn the many, many contacts and rules of thumb he has learnt over the years.

The responsibilities of Glenn Clark are so massive that the best way to figure out what he does is to simply consider what he doesn't do. The list will be smaller. Having just retired las year, we older folks look at him as the "youngster", "the kid". But his load is already so heavy, one more task may very well be the feather that sends this guy to his knees. Even "younsters" have a breaking point. A serious look at the many tasks he performs should be looked at in order to get him some support, relief and breathing room.

On this topic I appeal to St. James Parishioners that Reverend Joan needs support and understanding as well. Well passed the age of retirement she is single hangingfly the spiritual head of two churches. We should be setting routines and processes that take the heat from her as much as possible. Scheduling lay people to look after the reflection or service once in a while to give her a break would be a good move in the right direction. To restate what I said in the previous paragraphs, we would rather have her less than not have her at all. Every time something new or different is suggested, consideration needs to be given as to how this change will impact Joan.

#### **Growth and Future**

Thirty years ago I remember of being part of a discussion that St. James must make a strong effort to reach out and become part of the community around us. "Most people don't even know we are a church" was a common expression we used.

That expression is not used anymore as the community is well aware we are a church. We have greatly increased our outreach in the last 30 years. Our Christmas lighting is very much appreciated by the public. We never ceased to be amazed at the comments and e-mails we receive from people we don't know and have never met about our lights at Christmas. Comments from these people like "I hope to catch the red light at Bank and Leitrim Road so I have a few seconds to take in the Christmas lights" is a phrase used more than once. Sometimes people have showed up at church simply to visit the church who put on the Christmas lights. This is an outreach THAT MUST CONTINUE.

The folks at the food bank are well aware of St. James. They appreciate and anticipate our donations of food we make monthly. We need to continue this outreach.

We need to get back to Bridlewood as soon as it is safe and legal. We had a following there. They look for us. Our yard sale, two dinners and murder mystery all have a profound impact on the public. They need to continue.

All of these acts of outreach need to continue if we want to grow and become a bigger part of the community. Perhaps even come up with a few more.

But without question the most important feature of growth is one that has always been with us. Our dedication and love for Jesus Christ our Saviour is on of our greatest assets. The outreach may bring new folks to St. James but it is our love of our Lord and Saviour that will keep them here.

One of our best human assets is the Reverend Joan Riding. Joan is a non-confrontational spiritual leader. She will <u>NOT</u> confront! She will debate. I often marvel at our meetings and watching Joan in action. Many times the discussion will be going and I know from conversations with her that the discussion is not going the way she would prefer. Yet you would <u>NEVER</u> see anything from Joan's's expression or demeaner that she prefers the opposite to what we are leaning towards. She will debate and use facts and logic. Sometimes she loses but she more often wins by convincing everyone that the other approach is best. Considering that both St. James and All Saints Greely are churches with older congregations. With folks that are set in their ways; full of pride, loyalty and habit, Joan is the perfect leader for our church and the association with All Saints Greely.

To conclude it is my observation, that to grow and secure our future we need to continue our outreach, continue to love our Lord and Saviour and follow the non-confrontational approach used by our spiritual leader; the Reverend Joan Riding or someone else with the same wonderful qualities.

Here's to our future with the Lord and the results should not take 30 years.

#### People's Warden Report for 2020

Glenn Clark

2020 will be a year that will not be forgotten. Personally, it has been a year of transition from my career to retirement, but more importantly a year of tremendous disruption because of the world-wide COVID pandemic. This affected all of us in so many ways and also our beloved St. James.

Despite the disruption, there have been many blessings. How can we thank TAD Higginson enough for setting up our on-line services? Our parish would be in dire straits without his ongoing support. I thank you TAD with all my heart. I am also thankful that we were able to join forces with All Saints Greely during these difficult times and that our Sandra Donatucci and Grace Jones from All Saints were willing to host the services when TAD was not available.

When 2020 began or soon after, we began hearing of a mysterious new virus in Wuhan, China. It all seemed so remote at the time, but things began to change quickly in early March as cases started to arrive in Canada. We had no idea what the implications would be. Initially, we adjusted by taking precautions during services and I recall preparing the bulletin on March 13<sup>th</sup> advising everybody that we would not have Holy Communion that Sunday, only to cancel the service outright just 15 minutes later, on the advice of the Diocese.

#### **Events Before the Pandemic**

It seems that the beginning of 2020 was prophetic. We lost our dear Alice Purdy on January 7<sup>th</sup>. It was like she just flew away. I had spent a couple of hours at the hospital with Alice on New Years eve and we talked about a better 2020. Alice had lost her mother just a month earlier. This was the last time I saw her when she could communicate. It was all so fast. We knew she had serious medical problems, but I had hoped that treatment was still possible. Given what has happened since, it may have been a blessing. I can't imagine Alice facing the pandemic with her medical problems.

The weather also did not cooperate, and we had to close the church for a couple of Sundays in a row in January. It seemed that we were on a weekend snowstorm schedule for the full month of January.

There were a few successes during the early months. We were able to enjoy a scaled down version of the Shrove Tuesday Pancake dinner in the church hall (basement) on February 25th. It was getting too expensive to rent the seniors hall next door for a weekday event. The following evening, we hosted the Ash Wednesday service with our friends from All Saints Greely. On March 1<sup>st</sup>, we had a special Family Praise service that is always enjoyable. The liturgy and music are different, and we can thank the Thomas family, TAD and Sandra Donatucci for their involvement with the music and Reverend Joan Riding for preparing a different style of service.

#### The Pandemic

We then spiraled down into the pandemic with our March 15<sup>th</sup> service cancelled. Initially, we were told that our church would be closed until Easter, but I had a sinking feeling and there was talk of how the virus would last 18 to 24 months. That was almost frightening to hear, yet here we are almost a year later, and that estimate now seems reasonable.

#### **On-Line Services**

When TAD first brought up an on-line service, I have to admit that I was a little skeptical. I had only participated in one video conference before and it had not achieved its objective. People had problems using the technology. But the offer was made, so let's go with it. And it worked! We missed only one service. It was trial and error to a degree as we learned the technology. We started with Zoom but there was quickly talk of security issues and 'Zoom bombing' (unwelcomed visitors to the video conference). We switched to Webex a few weeks later and then perfected our use of the technology (as much as possible) by controlling and restricting the microphones to the presenters. Open microphones were problematic with so much noise feedback and overtalking and 'choir' singing does not work in this environment. Of course, there were some ongoing technical problems, but it worked well enough for most people.

On-line services and the technology involved does not work for everybody and some parishioners did not participate or dropped out. This was an ongoing concern, but this was the best we could do under the circumstances. By decree from the Diocese and following public health advice, we were obligated to keep our church building and even the church grounds closed to any public event. It became quickly apparent that our full complement of 2020 scheduled events were going to be cancelled.

#### **Church Closure**

I have been concerned about the long-term impact of keeping the church closed. How would we grow the parish and make up for those who move away or passed? God has answered, as we have had new 'regulars' at the on-line service. I would not have thought this possible.

We did have the opportunity to re-open the church in September, but the rules were very strict, and many were very concerned about the risks. We decided to remain closed and in retrospect, this was the wise choice. Who would have come? How could we have both a live and an on-line service? Both would have been necessary and there were two parishes to be concerned about. It would have been a potentially a mess, let alone a serious health risk to all involved and particularly our minister, Reverend Joan Riding.

#### Our Angel, Reverend Joan Riding

What can I say? Reverend Joan has gone beyond the call of duty. This may not be fully recognized when many of us seem to be at home and there is not a lot to do, or so it may seem.

We all know this is not true. We have all been trying to keep in touch with family and friends and watching out for our mental and physical health with the world in total flux. Behind the scenes, Joan has been working hard to keep God's flock together. This is a responsibility she has been taking seriously. Those phone calls and notes that we have all received and those written reflections that appear in each Sunday's service bulletin are more than what would normally be done in non-pandemic times. As the months of the pandemic continue, it has been demanding and draining. I thank Joan for her ongoing kindness to us all. None of us can do what you have been doing for the last 11 long months and counting.

#### Finances for 2020

I have also been concerned about our finances. All our special fund-raising events were cancelled. Would donations decline as in-person contact became very restricted? God has answered again. The diocese did not require a monthly payment during April and May and from I have learned recently, the diocese has been able to obtain government funding to make up for that loss of money. Furthermore, everybody has kept up their donations and despite our loss of special event revenue, we have ended 2020 with a surplus of over \$9,000. In order to facilitate donations, we set up a PayPal account shortly after the pandemic started and added a 'Donate' button on our website. We all did well in keeping the church financially supported so we could continue to pay the bills. Thank you.

#### **2020 Christmas Lights**

Another victim of the pandemic was fundraising for the church Christmas Lights. It appeared that there may not be enough money for us to proceed this year. But again, there was a leap of faith. Reverend Joan felt it was an important outreach to the community during a period of 'darkness' and would help raise people's spirits. It was a sign of the light of God. Mike Thomas felt that we could manage it even with a parish subsidy and at a special meeting in late October, the OK was given. Sandra Donatucci suggested a GoFundMe page, which successfully raised several hundred dollars. I thank Sandra, for making this a success. The leap of faith actually resulted in an unexpected and significant surplus for the Christmas Lighting fund, so no subsidy from the church was needed. Well done to everybody who supported this effort.

Following the parish OK, I checked the lights for defects and looked for sales. Unlike previous years, there were no sales and the lights purchased in the early years from Canadian Tire continued to fail at alarming rates. I have stopped buying Canadian Tire Noma lights. Because other retailers did not sell pink lights, which was a significant part of the display, I decided to source professional grade lights. I had placed a test order in 2019 for use at home with very good results. The professional grade lights were not that much more expensive compared to consumer grade lights, so I decided to replace our entire complement of pink lights. The results have been excellent.

Also, during 2019, I experimented with coloured flood lights on the church and I was very pleased with the results. It really shows off the church well. Blue lights were used during Advent and then changed to red and green for the Christmas season. I improved the flood lighting of the church this year particularly at the rear of the church, that had been ineffective in 2019. The other addition was a new Angel.

The light display was activated on December 1<sup>st</sup> with some in-person visitors from both within and outside the parish as well as an on-line broadcast thanks to TAD and Amanda Higginson. I thank TAD and Amanda. The children who came loved it, although there was no ceremony this year.

The light display was very well received with many compliments coming in from the community. Because of the lockdown that began on December 26<sup>th</sup>, it was decided to run the lights beyond the normal shutdown date following the second weekend of January. I will likely turn them off for the beginning of Lent if that is the desire of the parish.

We are still regularly encountering short outs, requiring regular resets during wet weather. I wish to thank Garry Cutts who built a number of 'shelters' to protect the main electrical plugs next to the church and some of the ground connections. The nativity scene and 'Merry Christmas' sign remain sources of short outs but not exclusively. This is very disappointing as they are some the highlights of the display and I have not been able to find decent replacements. We tried to apply a special oil to reduce shorts, but any improvements were very temporary. As a result of the ongoing problems, Garry Cutts arranged his electrician neighbour to look at the situation. At the present time, all the outdoor plugs use the same breaker connection in the electrical panel, and he has recommended that we separate each of the outdoor plugs in the panel. There is plenty of room. I recommend that this be done during the warmer months of 2021. Also, the plug on the north side of the church failed and will need to be replaced.

I also have a few ideas to 'change' the display for 2021 if we decide to continue with this outreach program. I like to change it up a bit each year. Although, it is a lot of work to set up and maintain the display, I do enjoy the design work and I am happy to continue to work on this project as long as I am physically able to do so.

#### Other outreach

Something else lost during the pandemic is much of our outreach. There were no Bridlewood services after the pandemic began, no Salvation Army Kettle campaign, no Christmas caroling etc. But I wish to thank fellow warden Vic Wootton, who resurrected our food collections for the Pavilion food bank that were interrupted and our Operation Christmas Child donations (Christmas shoeboxes).

Although not really outreach, the Foster farm vegetable market again opened for the summer 2020, the most successful season yet. It has been another way that helps our bottom line. They have already asked to return for 2021 and we have answered with a resounding 'Yes'.

#### **The Coming Year**

What can I say? As I write this, we are still under lockdown. Our church is still closed. The vaccines are now being distributed, very slowly, but with a promise of inoculating the entire population by September. What does this mean? Our church will not be reopening any time soon and there is no point in planning any events for 2021. It is discouraging and I am so afraid when we have not seen so many parishioners for so long.

Our treasurer is projecting that we will break-even for 2021 but there remains great uncertainty. The hope is the vaccine. Perhaps, just perhaps, we can look forward to significantly reduced health precautions by fall. So, when can we re-open St. James? Labour Day? Thanksgiving? Christmas? We don't know.

In the meantime, we need to keep in touch with each other, and I ask you to consider calling someone. It is often difficult to keep up with phone calls, but I ask you to consider calling someone in the parish maybe once every week or two. Just to keep in touch, and to hold our faith community together.

I also suggest that when in-person services finally become safe again that we consider some sort of significant celebration.

Let us pray to God that 2021 will be better and we can return to a normal life sometime this year.

### **Wood's Cemetery Report – 2020**

Vic Wootton Jr was hired to maintain the cemetery for 2020. He maintained the cemetery regularly during the months from April to October.

The annual memorial service was cancelled in June due to COVID pandemic.

There were no burials in 2020.

A Labour Day windstorm caused one of the old Norway Maples at the front of the cemetery to break and it became a serious hazard of falling onto Bank Street. We arranged to have the tree cut down later in September as well as another tree that had been damaged in an ice storm a couple of years earlier. It will be necessary to remove the base of both trees in 2021.

The cemetery finances had a surplus of \$1,327.59. This is mostly thanks to a generous donation by James G. Dropp.

The cemetery committee consists of Glenn Clark, Victor Wootton, Maureen Kemp, Don Eccles and Christine Boisclair.

I wish to thank Vic Wootton Jr., and his son Billy for maintaining the cemetery and Mike Thomas for keeping the cemetery Financial records.

No 2021 memorial service has been scheduled because of the ongoing pandemic and one is unlikely to take place unless health precautions are substantially reduced by June.

Reverend Joan Riding, Rector's Warden Victor Wootton, and Synod Member Charles Wootton attended the 139<sup>th</sup> and 140<sup>th</sup> Sessions of The Diocese of Ottawa Synod 139 of March 14<sup>th</sup>, 2021; and Synod 140 of October 24<sup>th</sup>, 2021 respectively. There was no Great Chapter Meeting and the October Synod was virtual due to the pandemic.

At the spring Synod 139, convened to elect a Bishop as Bishop John Chapman was retiring; the candidates were: The Venerable Christopher Ian Dunn, The Venerable Dr. Peter John Hobbs, The Venerable Brian Kauk, The Venerable Kathryn Anne Otley, The Very Reverend Shane Alexander Donaldson Parker, and the Reverend Mark William Glen Whittall.

**Bishop Parker** was elected on the 5<sup>th</sup> ballot as shown hereunder.

#Clergy% , #Lay %

The Very Reverend Shane Alexander Donaldson Parker.......51 69%, 77 51.7

Synod 140 in the Autumn; was held on a Saturday via the Internet.

There was no Thursday night Eucharist as has been the custom.

Canon Doug Richards briefed us on Zoom etiquette. [ mute during meeting, unmute to ask a question, may text questions, don't push the chat button]

Bishop Parker introduced the Diocesan Chancellor, Henry Schultz who explained how we arrived at this Synod during a pandemic. He addressed legal aspects of Synod which itself was demanded by our Canons *even during pandemics*. It was virtual because current Law forbids indoor conferences in general. However, non-

profit organizations are permitted to use video conferencing. Only basic matters demanded by the Diocesan canons, bylaws and regulations were to be covered.

The basic matters were: 1. Approving new members to Diocesan Council.

- 2. The presentation on Diocesan Finances. 3. Re-appointing the Auditor.
- 4. This current annual meeting which defines the end of the synod year for various purposes such as taxation, appointments etc.

#### The Bishops Charge

The Bishop referred to the Apostle Paul as he addressed the Thessalonians via his Letter in 50 A.D.

He mentioned giving thanks to God for all in your group that he has chosen for you to work with in faith and love. Like the Thessalonians, some of us came from other Religions. {Currently our suffering relates to the Pandemic.}. He urged us not worry about the future, but to focus on being "Children of the Light" and persevere.

He reminded us to use eyes of faith, hope and love in our quest for, peace and purpose. To pray for our group to be creative, to stick together and to be profoundly effective. To find out what it means to be a Diocesan Church. To join with your compassion and wisdom to help complete services to the needy.

Then the Bishop pointed out our collective assets:

- 1. The Diocese of Ottawa One Big Church,
- 2. Parish and Diocesan Members One Big Parish
- 3. Community Parishes in Buildings
- 4. Community Panel
- 5. Second Panel

He implied a few applications.

(4.) can provide plans, (5.) can consult with (3.) and (2.); re plans for

6. New Buildings and populating them.

This involves both Parish and Diocesan Members (2.) as (1.)

That is 1. Big Church!

7. "Do not let them think Church has abandoned them!"

He went on to say with all four Dioceses, there can be a Governance review by a

Diocesan Committee. This will enable building the capacity to help troubled groups discover more precisely the causes of their troubles and how to go peaceably about diminishing them.

The pandemic has caused hardship and loss so we have to take on new and voluntary actions.

Take care of yourselves. Do what makes sense relative your mission. Stay healthy so you can serve others.

Find peace and purpose to serve the World.

.....

The Bishop set our collective focus on 4 renewed and refreshed strategic priorities:

- \*communications
- \*the shape of parish ministry and buildings
- \*engagement with the world
- \*lifelong formation, worship and hospitality

Eventually we will need the equivalent of a face-to-face meeting of Synod.

Two episcopal panels have been created:

The **Communications Panel** -to create a strategic communications strategy.

The **Shape of Parish Ministry Consultation Team** -focussed on the success of Parish-ministries-as-a-whole. This will mean some buildings will have to be closed, others built. No one will be left without a Parish.

#### **Basic Matters**

Next Synod approved the appointment: Members of Diocesan Council,

the Advisory Panel on the Termination of Clerical Appointments, The Provincial Synod and Trinity College Corporation. Then the financial report was given by the Director of Financial Ministry, Sanjay Grover. Things have been improving (about 20% over the last forecast). See the financial package at; (https://www.ottawa.anglican.ca/Synod)

Synod approved a motion to appoint Deloitte LLP as auditors of the Dioceses 2020 financial statements. Synod also approved a motion to accept the minutes of the 140<sup>th</sup> session of Synod.

After a closing prayer led by Dean Beth Bretzlaff, and a blessing from Bishop Shane; the meeting adjourned.
